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Introduction

The 2021 - 2025 County of Arenac Plan was prepared by the County Board to serve as a decision making document. The Plan will serve as a guide for the improvement of recreation facilities in the future.

The County of Arenac takes great pride in its recreation facilities and services and is always seeking to improve recreational opportunities for residents and visitors. Additionally, County residents place a high value on recreation and open space. Community officials have taken a proactive lead in updating this Recreation Plan to ensure the long-term use of these resources.

The County of Arenac is a rural forested area bordering Lake Huron and Saginaw Bay. The county is part of the northern Michigan recreational area, with resort development along Lake Huron. Natural assets such as the Gladwin State Forest, the Au Gres and Rifle Rivers and the Lake Huron shoreline, make it attractive for tourism. Agriculture is an important segment of the economy and accounts for 48% of land use. The County of Arenac is part of the six-county, state designated Huron Shores Heritage Route, one of 14 in the state.

The county is a popular recreation area, with plenty of canoeing, kayaking, hunting and fishing. The Au Gres and Rifle Rivers continue to be favorite canoeing, kayaking and fishing spots. Favorite fish include trout, perch, walleye and smelt. Suckers are also a popular favorite, celebrated annually with the City of Omer's Sucker Festival. Local efforts are underway to restore the reputation of the Pine River as an excellent perch fishing river. The DNR Lake Huron Boat Launch and break wall located at the mouth of the Au Gres River. The City of Au Gres features a mooring facility that can accommodate recreational boaters via the Au Gres River. This site is the former MDNR Harbor of Refuge facility, which was deeded to the City in August of 2018.

The City of Au Gres includes a marina on Lake Huron with an inland channel to the city.

The County draws many nature and hunting enthusiasts. Located just to the west of Au Gres is the Gladwin State Forest which provides good small game hunting. There is also the Wigwam Bay State Wildlife Area located about halfway between the cities of Standish and Au Gres, near the Saginaw Bay. Birders and other

wildlife enthusiasts flock to Charity Island located in the Bay, just off Whitney Township. Almost 80% of this 222 acre island and its three miles of shoreline are owned by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which brought the island into the national protected area called the Michigan Islands National Wildlife Refuge.



The foundation for the development of the County of Arenac Recreation Plan was based on the following process:

- Involve the community in the process to develop a five-year Recreation Plan,
- Inventory and map existing County of Arenac recreational facilities,
- Build common ground among County area stakeholders in addressing the future recreational needs and priorities of the community,
- Enable County of Arenac to be eligible for financial assistance based upon the Recreation Plan,
- Facilitate interagency collaboration in establishing recreation goals, objectives, and actions,
- Continue to support and implement improvements for barrier-free, Universal Access for County of Arenac area parks, and
- Expansion upon goals and objectives set forth in existing planning documents that deal partially or wholly with recreation.

In accordance with the policies of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR), this five-year Plan covers the period from 2021-2025. The content and process follow DNR requirements for a community Parks and Recreation Plan.

Implementation strategies are identified over the next five years, at which time the Plan will again require updating. The delineation of these improvements will aid the County in grant solicitation from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and long-range capital improvement budgeting. Additionally, during the next five years, it is important for the community to reference the Plan and make appropriate priority adjustments as conditions change and funding opportunities arise. As this update of the Recreation Plan is undertaken by the County of Arenac, it will be important for strong feedback between residents and planning

officials so improvements and ideas from the 2015 Community Recreation Plan can be further refined to align with the community's vision for parks and recreation in the County today.



Community Description

GEOGRAPHY


The County of Arenac is located on the shore of Lake Huron in the east central section of Michigan's Lower Peninsula. It includes 368 square miles, or 238,097 acres. The County is bordered by losco and Ogemaw Counties to the north, Bay County to the south, Gladwin and Bay Counties to the west. Lake Huron makes up the county's eastern border. The county is 30 miles wide from east to west at its widest point and 17 miles from north to south at its deepest point. The following townships are located in the county: Adams, Arenac, Au Gres, Clayton, Deep River, Lincoln, Mason, Moffatt, Sims, Standish, Turner, and Whitney. The county also includes the cities of Au Gres, Omer, and Standish and the villages of Sterling, Turner, and Twining. Several unincorporated places exist in the county: Alger in Moffatt Township, Melita and Maple Ridge in Clayton Township, Worth, Pine River, Saganing, and White's Beach in Standish Township, Moores Junction in Adams Township, Old Arenac Village in Arenac Township, Point Au Gres in Au Gres Township, Point Lookout in Sims Township, and Whitestone Point in Whitney Township.

DEMOGRPAHICS

Table 1, on the following page, summarizes the data explained in this section. In 2000, the County had a population of 17,269 residents, in 2010 the population decreased to 15,899. This was a decrease of approximately 1,370 people, or 7.9%. According to the 2017 ACS, the population in the County is 15,238. This is a decrease from the 2010 Census. However, it is important to remember ACS data is estimate data and the Decennial Census is a full population count. The County will not have another full population count until the 2020 Census. Until that time, the County should consider the trends indicated by the ACS data, but should not rely on them. In comparison the State and County, bith lost population, at -7.9% and -0.6%, between 2000 and 2010, while the United States gained almost 10%.

An in-depth analysis of the population trends in each jurisdiction of the County of Arenac between 2000 and 2010 shows that each City and Village in the County had a population decline, and all the Townships aside from Moffatt and Sims also had population declines. Of the three Cities in the County, Au Gres had the steepest decline at 13.5%, Standish lost 4.6%, and Omer lost 7.1%. Of the Villages, Turner had the largest population decline at 18%, while Twining declined by 5.7% and Sterling declined by 0.6%, the smallest percentage of all the Cities and Villages in the County. The Townships had similar rates of decline, with most ranging between 1% - 6%. The outliers were Clayton Township with a decrease of 0.4%, the smallest of all the jurisdictions in the County, and Lincoln Township with a decrease of 38.1%. Mason and Tuner Townships both had decreases of approximately 14%. In comparison, Moffatt Township increased in population from 1,121 to 1,184, or 5.6%, and Sims Township increased from 1,091 to 1,095 or 0.4%.

Overall the County has more males than females, in 2010, 49.3% of the population in the County was female, and 50.7% was male. This compares to 48.6% of the population that was female and 51.4% was male in 2000. Between 2000 and 2010, the percentage of the female population in the County increased, but both groups decreased in population.

Over the past decade, the age distribution of the population in the County of Arenac has changed significantly. The overall population in the County is aging, this is illustrated in the age ranges 45-64 and 65-84, and 85+, because these three were the only groups to have an increase in population between 2000 to 2010, even though the County lost population. The younger age groups have similar trends to one another, in that each group lost population. The loss is most reflected in the 25-44 age group, which has experienced losses over 6%. When comparing the age ranges throughout the County, the largest population of residents (32.1%) is in the 45-64 age group, which experienced a 6.5% increase in population from the 2000 figures. These figures can be found in Table 2.

In the County in 2010, there were a total of 9,803 housing units, of which 6,701, or 68.4%, are occupied and 3,102, or 31.6% were vacant, see Table 3 below. These percentages are very different than that of the State and Country, which both have similar occupancy rates in the mid to high 80% range and vacancy rates in the mid to low teens. The County's high vacancy rate can be attributed to the many seasonal homes located throughout the County.

The U.S Census breaks down vacant units into the following categories: seasonal, for rent, rented, but unoccupied, for sale only, sold but unoccupied, or other vacant. If a housing unit is only seasonally occupied, the Census considers it vacant, therefore the high vacancy rates in the County can be explained by the large amount of seasonal housing units. There is a high percentage of seasonal housing throughout the County, particularly along the shoreline and in the wooded areas of the County.

High seasonal vacancy rates are not a reality for all County communities, and this trend is most apparent when the vacancy rates in each township, city, and village are compared individually against the State and Country rates. The communities that do not have a large number of seasonal housing units compare more closely to the percentages of the State and Country. The majority of the cities and villages in the County of Arenac have rates that are comparable to the State. See Table 4, on the following page, for a comparison of housing vacancies. The difference between the types of seasonal vacancies would be lakefront homes in Sims, Whitney, and Au Gres Township versus wooded cabins in Moffatt Township.

In addition to the population and housing characteristics above, there are several other demographic data points that are important to understand the County and the recreation trends the County population may need. The County has the smallest average household size at 2.34, compared to the State and the Country, and the highest median age, at 46.7. This median age is almost 10 years older than Michigan and the Country. These two factors correlate to one another, because the County has a smaller average household size, indicating less families in the County with children, which is reinforced by an older median age.

There are several segments of the population that rely more heavily on public recreation than others, several of those are highlighted in Table 5 below. Renters do not often have access to private outdoor space that single-family homeowners do. Therefore, renters, rely on public recreation options that are close to home. In the County of Arenac, 16.4% of the housing units are occupied by renters, this significantly smaller than that of the State and Country, but still represents almost 1/5 of the housing units in the County. Other groups who rely on public recreation options are those who live in poverty, this population is 18.5% of the County. Additionally, the County has a median household income that is more than \$10,000 less than the State and Country, indicating a population with a smaller disposable income.

NATURAL RESOURCES INVENTORY

The climate of the County is relatively mild. The close proximity to Lake Huron modifies abrupt variations in temperature. February temperatures average 32 degrees F. July temperatures average 80 degrees. Annual precipitation, in inches, is 31.22. Most of the precipitation falls as rain. Precipitation during the growing season is sufficient for a wide variety of crops. The ground is covered with snow an average of 82 days a year. Prevailing winds from the southwest and are generally strongest in March, although conditions near the shoreline vary widely. The length of the growing season varies within different areas of the county from 120 to 140 days; the area along Lake Huron having the longest growing season, and the area in the extreme northwest corner of the county having the shortest.

The Saginaw Bay and the Pine, Rifle, and Au Gres rivers and their tributaries offer excellent fishing. Walleye, Perch, Trout, Coho, and Chinook salmon produce exceptional sport fishing. Whitetail deer are present in abundant numbers throughout the county. The best numbers are found in the Gladwin Forest Area, part of the Au Sable State Forest, and in the Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area. Recent timber cuttings and oak stands are the most attractive areas for deer. Ruffed grouse and woodcock are present along streams, lowland brush, and recent aspen cutting sites. Squirrels are present in oak stands. Waterfowl hunting is excellent in the Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area and along the Saginaw Bay. Snipe hunting is great in the mud flats of Saginaw Bay during low water periods.

Most of the County is an old lake bed. Small areas consist of ground moraines and waterlaid moraines. In the lake bed areas, the material ranges from clay to clay loam, loam or sand in texture. In many places this fine-textured material has been covered by sand that ranges from six inches to many feet in thickness. Deep deposits of sandy material occur throughout the lake bed, but they are predominantly in the northwestern part of the county. Elevation of the lake bed ranges from slightly less than 600 feet to 750 feet above sea level. Of the 235,400 acres in the County, approximately, 43,400 or 18.4% are wetland areas according to the National Wetlands Inventory, see Map 3 for an inventory of all the waterways and wetlands in the County.


Dense forests originally covered most of the County of Arenac. The only areas that were not forested were swamps, lake beaches, sand dunes near Lake Huron, and small areas cleared by the Indians for their villages and gardens. On the sandy plains of the county in well-drained areas there were forests consisting of white pine, red pine, and jack pine. On the finer textured, well-drained soils, sugar maple, beech, yellow birch, elm, and hemlock grew. Elm, ash, basswood, red maple, aspen, yellow birch, white pine, hemlock, black spruce, white cedar, and balsam fir were dominant on the somewhat poorly drained mineral soils. In the peat and muck swamps, the native trees were mostly white cedar, black spruce, balsam fir, and tamarack. Reeds, sedges, and shrubs grew in openings in the swamps. About 34 percent of the County is now wooded, but the stands are mostly second-growth trees of poor quality. Aspen, scrub oak, and jack pine are the trees on the sandy plains where the virgin timber was mostly pines. In the other forests, the present stands consist chiefly of the original trees but the proportion of aspen in the stands is greatest. Nearly 15,000 acres are woodlands on farms and products of these wooded areas provide some cash income to farmers. Most of the remaining woodlands are owned by the State of Michigan. About 20,000 acres in the county have been planted to pines. Much idle land in the county is reforesting naturally according to the Soil Survey, Arenac County, Michigan. See Map 4 for an inventory of the wooded land in the County.

Of the forest land, which comprises over 34% of all the County acreage, approximately 32,000 acres are owned by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. This is 13.65% of the total gross area of the County, and 40% of all forest land. Most of the DNR property is in the Gladwin Forest Area, part of the Au

Sable State Forest. The DNR also owns 2,500 acres in the Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area which is dedicated to the improvement of waterfowl habitat and open to public hunting for deer and waterfowl. In addition, the State of Michigan has 109 acres of boating and fishing sites. There is no acreage owned by the U.S. Forest Service in the County. The Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan owns approximately 600 acres of land in the County of Arenac.

Administrative Structure

PARKS AND RECREATION ORGANIZATION

The County of Arenac Board of Commissioners established a Parks and Recreation Commission under authority of P.A. 261, as amended by Act 242 of 1966. The Parks and Recreation Commission was established and organized in 1978. In April 1996, the County of Arenac Board of Commissioners adopted Arenac County Ordinance 12. The County of Arenac Parks and Recreation Ordinance provides for the "use, protection, regulation and control of the property of the Arenac County Parks."

The Chairman of the County Parks and Recreation Commission serves as the Parks Administrator.

Responsibilities and Duties of the Parks and Recreation Administrator

Duties:

- Build an effective organizational structure to achieve basic objectives and policies adopted by the Park Commission.
- Select personnel who have necessary skills.
- Develop a supervisory organization and program to achieve maximum desired results from personnel.
- Inform and interpret Parks Commission policies to the public.
- Assist Commission in planning for future development and changes in the County Parks
- system.
- Annually evaluate facilities, structures, and equipment, as well as financing of improvements and report to the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners, and then to the Parks Commission.
- Administer business functions of the parks system including reports and records.
- Maintain inventory records.

Responsibilities:

- Prepare annual budget and supervise conformity to it.
- Develop good public relations with organizations interested in the betterment of the parks system.
- Monitor for and remove potential hazards and provide for an effective risk management program.
- Care, maintain and store equipment.
- Assure that operations are within compliance and conformity with applicable laws.
- Supervise general care and maintenance of areas, structures and facilities.
- Prepare plans and specifications, or have them prepared when necessary.
- Supervise selection of all horticultural materials and the planting and preservation of the same.
- Supervise all construction activities in the parks.




Relation between Acting Parks Administrator and the Parks and Recreation Commissioners:

- Keep membership informed and alert them of potential conditions that may adversely affect the parks system.
- Work with committees as appointed from time to time, and prepare written reports of their activities to the Parks Commission.
- Attend all meetings of the Commission and its Committees.
- Act as Parks Commission's Liaison Officer.
- Prepare public relations materials.
- Prepare policies materials.
- Contact all complainants and inform proper persons of any complaints that are considered serious.
- Submit an annual report to the Commission and the Recreation Services Division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources as required by Act 26.

Responsibilities of the Commission.

The Commission shall assume such authority as granted by the applicable section of the laws of the State of Michigan in the Michigan Compiled Laws and no other authority. The chain of command is illustrated on the Organizational Chart. The Commission consists of 10 members, who are appointed by the County Commissioners. It meets as needed with standing meetings in December, January, and throughout the summer season.

COUNTY OF ARENAC PARKS STRUCTURE





The parks have user fees for the campgrounds, and pavilions which are used for maintenance of the park facilities. These figures are included in the budget.

VOLUNTEERS, COLLABORATION, AND PROGRAMMING

The County does not currently have any volunteers or collaboration with any local organizations. The County also does not provide any recreation programming.



Recreation Inventory

The County of Arenac has three parks, which comprise 314 acres of park land, and one fairgrounds property which is 40 acres. The County Parks inventory was conducted during the fall of 2019. The planning consultant performed site visits in order to obtain necessary information about the County parks. A description of each park and its amenities is given on the following pages. A park location map is included at the end of this chapter. Individual aerial images of each park are contained in Appendix A. This chapter also briefly discusses the natural features, parks, and recreational property in each jurisdiction.

ACCESSIBLITY

Creating a park system that is safe, accessible and usable to all individuals, including those with disabilities, is essential. A grading system has been developed by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to simply and effectively rate parks and facilities on their ease of use and accessibility for handicapped residents, based on the American Disabilities Act (ADA) guidelines. The accessibility grading system uses a five point system ranging from one (none of the facilities/park areas meet accessibility guidelines), to five (the entire park was developed/renovated using the principals of universal design). See Table 7, below.

An ADA compliance assessment of parks owned and operated by the County of Arenac was conducted during the fall of 2019 by the planning consultant and was verified by County staff. The County is dedicated to improving accessibility at each of its parks when improvements are made. This includes accessible parking, paths, restrooms, activity areas, amenities, and signage.

COUNTY PARKS

Oasis Lake Park and Campground

Oasis Lake Day Park is located in Section 3 of Adams Township off Old M-76. This 207-acre site with a 22-acre lake formed from a barrow pit. Swimming and fishing are permitted. Pit toilets, changing rooms, water wells, three pavilions, picnic areas including approximately 120 picnic tables and 20 grills, horseshoe pits, as well as playground equipment including three sets of swings, a slide, and climbing equipment are available at this site. The park has 25 primitive campsites and a walking trail that winds along the lake, through the woods, through various picnic areas, beach volleyball courts, horseshoe pits, and various pavilions. There is no motorized watercraft allowed on the late, but it is a good place for kayaking, canoeing, and fishing.

County Fairgrounds

The Standish Fairgrounds, located between South City Limits Road and Airpark Drive, is a 40 acre site is owned by the County. Facilities available at the Fairgrounds include a grandstand, four livestock barns, an exhibit building, and a 4-H building. The fairgrounds are the site of the County Fair although many other activities are held at this site. The County 4-H club uses the facilities for a broad range of activities ranging from raising animals to arts and crafts to an archery club. The playground is used for a variety of purposes ranging from family reunions and picnics to scouting and company picnics. The two baseball fields with fences, dugouts, and bleachers are no longer in use. The Fairgrounds also have a pavilion, mud volleyball pit, a mud pit for vehicle exhibitions, and a short oval demolition track.

Currently, the County Fairgrounds are located in the Standish Industrial Park. The current businesses of the industrial park are looking to expand their operations, but are limited due to land availability. Therefore, the County EDC is looking for a new home for the Fairgrounds. This will provide opportunity for the businesses in Standish and give the Fairgrounds a new permanent home better suited to the specific needs of the fair. The new fairgrounds will be called the Arenac County Events and Agricultural Center and the new site is 54 acres located off US-23, just south of the City of Standish. The proposed design includes an events arena with grand stands, Mid-Way Area, horse arena, animal barns for small animals, horses, cows, sheep, goats, pigs, and dogs, playground, central pavilion, parking, and a campground with over 100 spaces.

Youngman Park

Youngman Day Park is located on Arenac State Road in Arenac Township. This 100-acre roadside park featuring a pavilion, picnic tables, rustic camping, a water well, and about one-half mile of trails are located at this site. The northern property boundary of Youngman Park is connected to the proposed Iron Belle Trail Route and would be a great location for a trailhead in the future.

Point Au Gres Park and Campground


Point Au Gres Park is located at 3207 Rumsey Road. This County-owned facility of approximately 6.9 acres and has 1,030 feet of frontage on Lake Huron in the Saginaw Bay. The park offers swimming, fishing, picnic areas, children's playground, beach volleyball, horseshoes pits, and a barrier free boardwalk and dock along the beach. The park has three pavilions, 16 campsites, 7 with electric and water hookups, and 5 rustic cabins. The park is a kayak and canoe staging site along the Blue Water Trail.

OTHER LOCAL PARKS

Adams Township

Adams Township is located in the western part of the County and borders Gladwin County on the west and Bay County on the south. The North Branch of the Pine River runs through the Township. The State of Michigan owns over 7,900 acres or 35% of the land, most of which is in the Gladwin Forest Area as part of the Au Sable State Forest. The Michigan Department of Transportation holds a small section of land as a permanent right-of- way on 1-75.

Other Recreational Property

Oasis Lake Park and Campground, a County-owned park, is located in Adams Township.

Gladwin Forest Area is owned by the State of Michigan as part of the Au Sable State Forest. Over 7,900 acres are contained in this property. It encompasses most of the northern half of the Township. Recreation activities, such as hunting, fishing, and camping are permitted on these State lands unless they are posted against such use. The necessary licenses and permits are required.

Arenac Township

Arenac Township is located in the mid-section of the County and borders Lake Huron and Saginaw Bay on the southeast. The State of Michigan owns approximately 4,100 acres in the Township as parts of the Au Sable State Forest and the Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area. The Michigan Department of Transportation owns a small site as a roadside park.

The Rifle River crosses the Township diagonally from northwest to southeast emptying into Saginaw Bay. A major section of the Saverine Creek also runs from the western border emptying into the Rifle River just south of the City of Omer.

Other Recreational Property


Youngman Park, a County-owned park, is located in Arenac Township.

Harold Lemon Roadside Park is located on the southeast side of US-23 between Sterling Road and Omer in Section 21 of the Township. This site, approximately five acres, is owned by the Michigan Department of Transportation. It is a wooded area containing rustic toilets, a water hand pump, grills, and ten to twelve picnic tables.

Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area is a 4,326-acre property that falls within the boundaries of Arenac Township in portions of Sections 4 and 5 of T.18 N.-R.6E. Owned by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, this area's primary focus is recreational sport hunting for waterfowl, deer, pheasant, grouse, woodcock, rabbit, and turkey. The DNR is also using the area to increase waterfowl breeding and production. It is open to the public for educational viewing. In order to minimize disturbance to waterfowl and game, recreational vehicles are not permitted in the area; motorized vehicles are restricted to parking areas.

Gladwin Forest Area is owned by the State of Michigan as part of the Au Sable State Forest. This is comprised of over 4,000 acres located in parts of Sections 3, 4,5,7,8,13,14,17,18,23, and 24 of T.19N.-R.5E of Arenac Township. Recreation activities, such as hunting, fishing, camping, etc. are permitted on these State lands, unless they are posted against such use. The necessary licenses and permits are required.

There is one-fourth mile of Rifle River frontage adjoining State Road Park in Omer that is owned by the Lake State Railway Co.

The abandoned Detroit & Mackinaw Railroad Line Owned by Saginaw-Midland Water Supply Corporation is located approximately one-fourth mile north of and roughly parallel to US-23. Water pipelines extend underground the entire length of this property. The property is 100' wide and extends from Omer through Au Gres. In this township, it extends through Sections 13 and 14. It is the proposed location for a portion of the Governor's Showcase Trail in the county.

Big Bend Campground Inc. is located at 513 Conrad Road on the Rifle River. This privately owned facility has more than 180 campsites with electricity, showers, and toilets. A playground, lake, volleyball courts, recreation building, and boat slips are also available.

Riverbend Campground and Canoe Rental is located at 846 Main Street. This privately owned facility has

100 campsites with electricity, flush toilets, a picnic shelter, a children's playground, a store, and hiking trails. Canoe rental and fishing are available at this site.

The Whispering Pines Campground is at M-65 & Jose Rd. It is a privately owned and has 25 campsites with electricity, a flowing well and portable restrooms. Canoe and tube rentals are available at this site.

City of Omer

The City of Omer is located on US-23 in Arenac Township on the Rifle River.

City Property

At the City Hall there are is children's playground.

There is a fishing access site on Rifle River near the fire hall.

Five acres located north of US-23 to the east of the Rifle River includes frontage on the Rifle River. Although presently undeveloped, the City has preliminary plans for trails, picnic pavilion and a small parking area. It would include construction of a wood bridge across the Rifle River. Access will be available from Carrington Street and off U.S. 23.



The Omer State Road Park is 58.5 acres on Arenac State Road. It includes Rifle River frontage, Little League field, men's softball field, small pavilion, and play equipment. The City of Omer has plans for development of trails and a trailhead for the proposed regional trail system. This will be a proposed trailhead for the State's Iron Belle Trail. The conceptual plan for this development includes a paved parking lot, pavilion and an accessible play structure.



Other Recreational Property

The DNR Public Access Site on Michigan Avenue is approximately 0.75 acres on the Rifle River. There are steps to the river, fishing access, and an area to launch canoes. Parking for 40 cars is available.

DNR Land is located south of US-23, west of the Rifle River south of the property listed above. This site is currently undeveloped. Future plans include possibly purchasing or leasing this property for development as a park.

One-half city block near depot grounds is leased from the Lake State Railway Company and maintained as a roadside picnic area.

Sunrise Senior Services (Arenac County Council on Aging) is located at 131 Clyde. This facility is leased from Lake State Railway Company and is used as a group meal site and activity center for Senior Citizens. Other social events are occasionally held at this site.

Russell Canoes and Campground is located at 146 Carrington. This privately owned facility has 30 campsites with modern facilities. Canoes and tubes are available for rental.

The former County Courthouse, built in 1890 was built after the original courthouse burned to the ground. The paint was barely dry on the stately structure when the county seat was moved to Standish. The building sat vacant and abandoned until 1892, when it was purchased by the Masons. In June of 2005 the Arenac County Historical Society signed a contract to purchase this beautiful old building which is on the National Registry of Historic Places. The ACHS believes that this historic landmark is worth saving for future generations of County residents and visitors to Northeast Michigan. The ACHS currently hosts several events there as well as special meetings throughout the year.

Au Gres Township

Au Gres Township is located in the eastern part of the County, bordered on the south and east by Lake Huron and Saginaw Bay. The State of Michigan owns portions of Sections 10, 18, 19, and 30 as part of the Au Sable State Forest. Portions of Sections 28, 29, 30, 32, and 33 are owned by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources as part of the Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area. Also owned by the State are certain sections around Duck Lake. There are several major waterways in the Township which include: the Au Gres River, the Rifle River, and Big Creek.

Township Property

The Au Gres Township Boardwalk is located at the end of Santiago Road at the Saginaw Bay. The Township has developed a nature walk at the site which is known as the Point Au Gres Nature Lookout. In addition to the nature walk, this site includes access to Lake Huron during the winter months for ice fishing and snowmobiling. There is a 600' lighted viewing walkway and observation platform along with a lighted parking lot. The walkway/observation deck was constructed of pressure treated timber with a handicap accessibility ramp at the beginning of the walkway. Lights and reflectors were installed along the walkway for easy visibility. The parking lot is graveled and lighted and was constructed to accommodate vehicles with trailers. The site is handicap accessible and has restrooms and a picnic area. There is a cedar privacy fence along the east property boundary to protect and buffer the surrounding properties. The existing trees have been preserved for natural habitat on the site.

The Township also owns a 40 acres vacant site at the southwest corner of Noggle Road and Swanson Road in Section 15.

Other Recreational Property

Point Au Gres Park and Campground, a Countyowned park, is located in Au Gres Township.

There is a 400' X 400' site located at 2982 Booth Road. This site is presently owned by the Point Au Gres Association. In the past, it has been used as a park by the property owners in the area and occasionally by the public. A pavilion, picnic tables, bathroom, and running water are available. Because of the high cost of liability insurance, the Association has closed the park. The Township is considering the acquisition of this



property, but not for recreational purposes. Instead, the Township would consider this site for a storage tank for water if the Township succeeds in installing a water and sewer line to the Point area.

Part of the 4,326-acre recreational area Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area is located in Au Gres Township in portions of Sections 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33 and 34. This property is owned by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. The primary focus of this area is recreational sport hunting for waterfowl, deer,

pheasant, grouse, woodcock, rabbit, and turkey hunting. Waterfowl breeding and production is being increased in the area. Besides uses for hunting, it is open to the public for educational activities. No recreational vehicles are permitted in the area to minimize disturbances to waterfowl and game. Motorized vehicles are restricted to parking areas.

Gladwin Area Forest, owned by the State of Michigan as part of the Au Sable State Forest, is located in Sections 10, 18, 19, and 30 of the Township. Recreation activities such as hunting, fishing, and camping are permitted on these State lands unless they are posted against such use. The necessary licenses and permits are required.

The abandoned railroad line owned by Saginaw-Midland Water Supply Company is located approximately one-fourth mile north of and roughly parallel to US-23. Water pipelines are located underground on this property. The entire property extends from Omer through Au Gres. In this Township, it extends through Sections 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, and 18. This corridor was designated by EMCOG for use as a bike trail.

Point Au Gres Marina is located at 2325 Green Drive. This privately owned facility is a combination marina and campground. It has 80 boat slips and 75 campsites. The camp sites range from primitive to full hook-ups.

City of Au Gres

The City of Au Gres is located on US-23 in Au Gres Township, in the eastern section of the County. The Au Gres River, running through the City, provides a primary attraction to recreational visitors. The Harbor of Refuge, the Au Gres River, Point Lookout, and Point Au Gres on Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron are in this scenic section of the county. Au Gres offers great sport fishing on Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron and offers boat launching ramps and charter boats.



City Property

Au Gres City Park/Campground is a 23-acre site located along the Au Gres River on Park Street. The area for registered campers includes a concrete boat ramp, fishing access, a fish cleaning station, and 119 camp sites with electricity, a dumping station, picnic tables, restrooms, and showers. A children's playground is available for visitors.

The day park includes two little league baseball fields with fences and bleachers, two team dug-outs, a concession stand, restrooms, a 60' x 100' enclosed pavilion, a picnic area with tables, a fishing area with river

access, a shuffleboard court, two lighted tennis courts, two lighted basketball courts, a one- fourth mile walking trail, horseshoe pits, and a lighted riverfront walk.

The pedestrian bridge over the Au Gres River links the park to the downtown shopping area. Campers and local residents can easily and safely access areas north of US-23 without having to walk along the highway. The bridge is an integral part of the developing trails system including the lighted river walk on Water Street to the new Au Gres Community Library.

The Au Gres KinderPlatz Park is a half-acre site located on Michigan Avenue. This site includes a pavilion, picnic facilities such as picnic tables, grills, and benches, and a play area with playground equipment. Also on site is an historic German Church now named "The Chapel in the Park." The church is available for weddings.

Au Gres Industrial Park/Disc Golf is located in the northern park of the City of Au Gres to the west of Court Street. This site consists of approximately 140 acres of undeveloped woods and fields with recreational trails. It is used for informal play including disc golf and hiking.

Other Recreational Property

The Au Gres-Sims School is located on South Court Street in Au Gres. Both an elementary school and a high school are located at this site. Facilities include a multipurpose room, a gym, two tennis courts, which have basketball hoops and can be used as an outdoor basketball court, a baseball diamond, and a softball diamond, which can also be used as a football field, and elementary playground equipment. This site is 19.2 acres. The multipurpose room has a capacity of 200 persons. It is used with permission by community groups and is available for rental to private groups. The gym is used mainly by students during the school year, except for Wednesday evenings when it is open to alumni and on Sunday evenings when is used by a community group. During the summer it is available for use/rental by other groups. The outdoor facilities are used by certain groups such as the Pony League and various others on a regular basis. Other groups may schedule and reserve the facilities. If they are not being used, the outdoor facilities may be used by the public.

The Au Gres Harbor of Refuge and launch site, owned by the State of Michigan, is located on Water Street. The Au Gres Harbor of Refuge was being operated by the City of Au Gres but went into disuse over the past few years. The City of Au Gres is negotiating to buy the property. This harbor is one of 69 designated protective harbors and public marinas established for the safety and convenience of Great Lakes boaters. The 4.3-acre site has 35 slips. Marine fueling, sewage pump-out and water take-on, picnic grills, picnic tables, fishing access from docks and shoreline, bathroom and shower facilities, as well as parking for 30 cars is available at this site.

The Au Gres Access Site is owned by the State of Michigan, is located at South Main and Harbor Road. Facilities include a launch ramp, fishing access on the break wall and shoreline, and parking for nearly 300 cars. This site is designated on the Arenac Blue Water Trail.

The Arenac County Historical Museum, owned and operated by Arenac County Historical Society, is located on Michigan Avenue. This facility, which has no admission fee, is open to the public on weekends during the summer. Public programs are held monthly from May through September with exhibits appealing to every age and interest.

The Au Gres Yacht Club is located on River Drive. This private club operates a commercial marina and has docking facilities.

The Sleepy Oaks RV Campground is located on Main Street. This private facility offers car and trailer campsites, boat launching facilities, Lake Huron access and 293 sites.

Among other privately-operated recreational opportunities are charter boat services which provide fishing opportunities, diving opportunities, and even duck hunting possibilities. Some of these are within the City of Au Gres while the rest are a short distance from the city. Point Au Gres Marina provides two daily perch charters. One of its boats has a 20 passenger capacity and the other will accommodate 30 passengers.

Northport Marina offers two daily charters for walleye for up to six passengers. Besides these two, there are other charter providers. Most operate between May and September while some extend through November.

Huron Breeze Marina and Habortown Marina are private marina condominiums in the area. Huron Breeze Marina is located on Sage Creek and Harbortown Marina is located on the Au Gres River.

Clayton Township

Clayton Township is located in the northwestern section of the County and borders Ogemaw and losco Counties to the north. Within the Township are separate parcels of land belonging to the State of Michigan as part of the Au Sable State Forest. The State owns over 1,300 acres within Township boundaries. A section of the Rifle River runs parallel to the western border and there are several creeks in the Township which include: Burtch, Mansfield, Richter, and Townline Creeks.

Township Property

Melita Ball Park is located at the intersection of Townline and Bishop Roads in Section 34. This 120-acre site has three baseball fields with fences, bleachers, and dugouts. A water well, a playground, and toilets are available at this site.

Maple Ridge Ballpark is located off Reed Road in Section 11 of the township. This 4.5-acre site is undeveloped.

A one acre site is located in Section 21 of the Township on Dobler Road. This is the location of the Township Hall. The Hall has a seating capacity of approximately 90 and is used by Township residents. A pavilion and picnic tables are also situated on this site.

Other Recreational Property

An DNR Public Access Site is located in Section 18 of the Township on the Rifle River. This site is administered by the Recreation Division of the DNR. It has 20 parking spaces and toilet facilities.

Gladwin Forest Area, owned by the State of Michigan as part of the Au Sable State Forest, is located in Sections 7, 8, 17, 18, and 36 of the Township. Recreation activities are permitted on these State lands unless they are posted against such use. The necessary licenses and permits are required.

The Rifle River Canoe Rental is located at 5825 Townline Road. This privately owned facility has 25 camping sites with electricity and flush toilets. Canoe rental, fishing opportunities, nature trails, a recreation building, playground, and store are available.

Deep River Township

Deep River Township is located in the middle section of the County and contains 34.91 square miles. Of this, the State of Michigan owns various parcels that are part of the Au Sable State Forest and total 1,280 acres.

The Michigan Department of Transportation has retained a small parcel of land as a scenic area in the Township. Travel within the Township is facilitated by a section of the I-75 expressway with an interchange just west of the Village of Sterling. US-23 cuts through the southeastern tip of the Township, and there are several well maintained paved and gravel roads in the southern part of the Township. Waterways include the North Branch of the Pine River in the southern part of the Township and the Rifle River which runs across the entire width of the Township in the north. The Township also contains the western section of Saverine Creek.

Township Property

Deep River Township Ball Park is located east of the intersection of State Street and Locust Road in the Village of Sterling. Two fenced baseball fields are available at this site. One of the fields has dug-outs and

bleachers. There is a $50' \times 100'$ lighted pavilion on this property. The site also has pit toilets, 22 picnic tables, grills, playground equipment, and two soccer fields. The Township Hall is located on this property. With a


capacity of approximately 500 and kitchen facilities, it is available for rentals. It is also used regularly for preschool classes.

Other Recreational Property

The Au Sable State Forest (1,280 acres) is owned by the State of Michigan in the Gladwin Forest Area as part of the Au Sable State Forest. This land is divided into various parcels. One 160-acre parcel is located in the northwest part of the Township. The other parcels are in the northeast part of the Township. Some of these parcels are accessible by public roads but others are landlocked with no access. The Township has recently obtained an easement to the 80 acres in Section 3 off Franklin Trail.

The 4-H Club Property is located on M-76 in Section 19 of the Township and is held in trust by the County. It consists of approximately 25 acres of undeveloped land that is mostly pine trees.

The Standish-Sterling School District Property, 80 acres of forested land, are located on Sterling Road in Section 22 of the Township. This land is presently undeveloped. It is unavailable for public use.



The Standish-Sterling Central Junior High School is located on the southwest comer of Wyatt Road and Grove Street in Section 35 of the Township. The southern and western boundaries of this 80 acre site are surrounded by pine trees and the Pine River runs through the property. The facilities on-site include a gym, two baseball

fields with dug-outs and bleachers, a practice football field, a game football field with floodlights, a cinder track around the field, equipment for the field events in track and field, two sets of bleachers, and a scoreboard. When these facilities are not in use by the school, neighborhood use is permitted. These facilities are available for use/rental by community groups or organizations with the knowledge that certain restrictions and guidelines apply. The School District also offers summer recreational programs such as arts and crafts, swimming and instruction in swimming, training in track events for competition in the Northeast Michigan Olympics, basketball clinics, and much more.

The Standish Sterling Central High School is located in the northeast corner at the intersection of Wyatt Road and Grove Street in Section 35. The facility was built in 2001. This new high school compliments old facilities located at the junior high school as well as new facilities. The gymnasium offers a full-size basketball court with a seating capacity of over 7,500. When seating is not needed, two full-size courts are available. An auditorium for concert-type activities and plays seats around 1,000 and a swimming pool. Outdoor facilities at the site include an archery area, regulation baseball and softball fields with dugouts, and high school soccer fields with seating and a field house capable of hosting outdoor activities.

The Riverview Campground and Canoe Livery is located on 5755 Townline Road and is a privately owned facility offers more than 100 campsites which range between primitive sites to full hook-ups and even cabins. The site also has picnic facilities, showers and flush toilets are available, and 150 canoes available for rental.

Outdoor Adventure is located on the Rifle River and has 160 campsites with electricity and flush toilets available with a picnic area and pavilion. Horseshoe pits, volleyball opportunities, and a game hall are located at this site. A spring-fed pond is open for swimming. Tube and canoe rentals are available.

Crystal Creek Campground is located on Grove Road at the Rifle River and is a privately-owned facility has 110 campsites, most of which are modern. A few primitive campsites are available. Canoe and tube rentals are offered.

White's Canoe Livery is located approximately 2.5 miles north of Sterling on old M-70 and is a privately-owned campground and canoe livery with 100 group campsites, some with light duty electrical service. Modern plumbing facilities are available at the park's entrance. There are picnic tables and grills in a wooded setting. Canoe and tube rentals are available to campers.

Village of Sterling

The Village of Sterling is located in central Deep River Township.

Village Property

The Village Park at the Village Hall is bounded by State, Locust, Main, and Chestnut Streets. This one-block area contains ten swings, two slides, two sets of jungle bars, and four spring toys, horseshoe pits, two softball/baseball fields, four picnic tables, a barbecue pit, a small shelter, and a water pump. Two tennis



courts are also located at this site. During the 1998-2002 planning period, the village upgraded the ball fields and adding new playground equipment.

The Village Hall is located at 137 East Main at the intersection of Main and Cherry Streets and is a small building that accommodates about 40 people. It is occasionally used by Senior Citizens or other village residents.

Sterling Village Property, located in Section 6 of Deep River Township, is Village-owned property consisting of 80 acres of land-locked forest. It is adjacent to 160 acres of State Forest land. The Rifle River runs through the north end of the property. The Village is presently trying to obtain an easement to this property. After this easement is obtained, plans for this property include developing a picnic area and nature/cross-country ski trails.

Other Recreational Property

The Sterling Elementary School, located at the intersection of State and School Streets, is property is owned by the Standish-Sterling School District. There is a gym, a Little League field, outdoor basketball hoops, and a playground at this site. When this property is not in use by the school, neighborhood use is permitted. Within certain restrictions and guidelines, community groups or organizations sometimes use or rent the facilities.

Lincoln Township

Lincoln Township is located in the far southwestern part of the County and is bordered by Bay County. The Township contains several waterways which include the Pine River, the Middle and South Branches of the Pine River, and Saganing Creek.

Township Property

Lincoln Township owns 20 acres in Section 4 on Deep River Road approximately one-quarter mile north of M-61 where there are six ball fields and a small building.

City of Standish

The City of Standish is located on the border of Lincoln and Standish Townships, but the city limits are contained within Lincoln Township. The City of Standish is the Gateway to the Sunrise Side of Michigan. With the scenic US-23 route along Lake Huron, it has become the traditional rest stop for motorists to obtain food and fuel. Standish is headquarters for hunters, fishermen, cross-country skiers, and snowmobilers and would like to become the same for kayakers and canoers.



City Property

The City Park with a gazebo is located at the intersection of Beaver and North Grove Streets. Future plans for the City Park call for the complete landscaping of the property including, but not limited to, trees, shrubs, flowers, rock gardens, an automated sprinkler system, installation of electricity to the gazebo, decorative lighting for a walking path through the park, some type of seating, and improvement of the surface of the adjacent parking area for citizens using the park.

The Arenac Heritage Route Authority Standish Depot is located at the intersection of US 23 and M61 in the heart of the City of Standish. The Depot is a newly restored Michigan Central Railroad depot that was originally built in 1889. The Depot is the home of the Sunrise Welcome Center. It has displays of railroad artifacts and depot memorabilia. Outside are vintage British rail coaches and a D&M caboose open for viewing. The depot also has a bandstand used for events. The Depot hosts exercise sessions with the Runners' Club.

The Standish Elementary School, located at 583 East Cedar Street in Standish, is owned by the Standish-Sterling Community School District. The Elementary School was closed and is now used as a Community Center. According to the Community Center website, the purposed of the Community Center is to provide a safe and nurturing atmosphere for children during the summer months and after school. The Center works with the local school districts, 4-H at Michigan State University Extension, and other local partnerships. The facility features a theater, computer lab, game room, arts and crafts rooms, toy room, open space to play, reading stations, a large gymnasium, a meeting and event room, 3 soccer fields, 2 playgrounds, basketball hoops, and a full professional kitchen. In addition to these amenities for the children, the Community Center is also available to rent for outside groups.

The City Hall Park is located on East Beaver Street on the site of the old City Hall building. There is a 14 x 14 foot gazebo located between the New City Hall and the site of the old City Hall. Future goals include that the 50 x 90 foot slab remaining after the demolition of the old building would be made into outdoor basketball courts for summer use and an ice rink for winter activities. The City has currently bermed the space to hold water that will be supplied by the local Fire Department for the ice rink. The gazebo, which is used for public and



community events, is located adjacent to the site and will be wired for electricity to allow for automated lighting of the area and a possible sound system for convenience at the outdoor weddings performed by the Mayor of the City of Standish. The entire property will require additional landscaping, parking, and fencing.

The Arenac Lanes Bowling Alley, located in Standish Plaza, is a privately owned and operated facility that has twelve lanes with an attached game room which occasionally handles small banquets.

Mason Township

Mason Township is located in the north central part of the County and borders losco and Ogemaw Counties. There are 31.38 square miles in the Township. Approximately 20% of the land is owned by the State of Michigan. This ownership includes separated parcels of land which total almost 3,879 acres of the Au Sable

State Forest. No rivers run through the Township, but it is traversed diagonally from its northwest comer to its southeast corner by Big Creek. It also contains a section of Cedar Creek.

Township Property

A 40-Acre Site is located at the intersection of Maple Ridge and Lehman Roads in Section 13 of the Township. This site has a softball and a Little League field with bleachers, a horse arena, a water well, and pit toilets. Pine and oak trees border the southern and eastern edges of this property. A huge sandpit area is overgrown

with weeds and small trees, and there is also a grassy field of approximately eight acres. Possible future use includes basketball courts, horseshoe pits, shuffleboard courts, and/or a volleyball area.

Other Recreational Property

The Gladwin Forest is located for the most part in Sections 15,29,30,31,32,33, and 34 of the Township. There is a total of 3,878.68 acres included in this State owned land, which is part of the Au Sable State Forest. Recreation activities such as hunting, fishing, and camping are permitted on these State lands unless they are posted against such use. The necessary licenses and permits are required.

The Arenac County Sportsman's Club, located in the southeast comer of Section 20, is a 40 acre site is owned by the Arenac County Sportsman's Club. A clubhouse and rifle range are located on the property. Though usually available only to members, different shoots sponsored by this group are open to the public.

Village of Twining

The Village of Twining is located on the border of Mason and Turner Townships.

Other Recreational Property

The Arenac Eastern High School, located at 200 Smalley Street, is owned by the Arenac Eastern School District. However, the district is currently closing. Facilities include a gymnasium, a football field, a baseball diamond, a softball field, and a fully-equipped playground.

Moffatt Township

Moffatt Township is located in the far northwest comer of the County and is bordered by Ogemaw and Gladwin Counties. The Township is made up of 32.13 square miles. Of this, the State of Michigan owns approximately 5,777 acres. Most of the State-owned land is in the Au Sable State Forest while some is near Forest Lake. Waterways in the Township include sections of the Rifle River as well as Bear Creek and Wells Creek. The man-made Forest Lake, located in Sections 14, 15, 23, and 24 of the Township, was created in the 1970's by an impoundment of Wells Creek. It has had a major impact on development in the Township as approximately 1,200 acres surrounding the lake are in the Forest Lake Subdivision. Highway travel and access is excellent in the Township.

Township Property

Moffatt Township Ballpark, located off Old M-76 on Henry Street in Section 16 of the Township, is a site of approximately 40 acres that has three baseball fields, two of which have dugouts and bleachers, a pavilion enclosed on two sides, picnic tables, a water well, toilets, and a large storage shed. This property has a chain link fence along the Henry Street side.

The Township Hall is located on Newberry Street. Kitchen facilities are available. This hall is used for weekend bingo and occasionally rented to private groups.

Other Recreational Property

Eighty acres near Forest Lake is owned by the Standish-Sterling School District and located in Section 14 of the Township. This property is undeveloped and is not available for public use. Forest Lake Subdivision is located in Sections 14, 15, 23, and 24 of the Township. Forest Lake, formed by an impoundment of Wells Creek, is approximately 300 acres. There is no public access to the lake. All of the land surrounding the lake is privately owned. For property owners in the area, there are beaches and boat launches that provide

opportunities for fishing, swimming, and other water activities. A clubhouse, basketball court, campground, ball diamond, and dugouts are also available to property owners.

Gladwin Forest Area, owned by the State of Michigan as part of the Au Sable State Forest, is located in the southern one-third of the Township. It comprises over 5,600 acres which makes for almost 28% of the land in the Township. Recreation activities, such as hunting, fishing, and camping are permitted on these State lands unless they are posted against such activities. The necessary licenses and permits are required.

There is a Freeway Rest Area located south of the Alger exit. The site, owned by the Michigan Department of Transportation, is approximately 25 acres. It includes a heated building which houses flush toilets and running water that is open year-round. Telephones, parking for cars and trucks, 20-30 picnic tables, and a wooded relaxation area are provided at this site.

Sims Township


Sims Township is in the northeast of the county and is located on Lake Huron which forms its southern and eastern borders. The Township has 10.74 square miles which includes a small federally owned island called Little Charity Island. The Au Gres River crosses into the Township along the western border.

Township Property

The Sims and Whitney Township Beach, located in Section 2 of the Township, is jointly owned by Sims and Whitney Townships. This small, undeveloped property is the beach frontage part of the property used as a cemetery by the two townships. There are no facilities at the beachfront, and the site has parking for only four or five cars. Other cars park on the highway. Because of the beach's small size and secluded location, it is mainly used by Township residents.

Other Recreational Property

A parcel of land at Tonkey Road and Lake Huron is a narrow strip of land from Michigan Avenue to the Bay that has been deeded to the Arenac County Road Commission. It has a road leading into it, but the property is presently undeveloped.



There are various road endings in the Township under the jurisdiction of the Arenac County Road Commission which are open to the public. Among these are locations at the ends of Foster Road, Michigan Avenue, Bessinger Road, Tonkey Road, and Terrace Street as well as some very obscure road endings. Most road endings are 66 feet wide. These are used for access to the beach for various purposes, including access by ice fishermen in the winter. There is at least one area (Promenade Beach) which is used for beach strolls by the public. Some of the areas are primarily intended for the use of property owners who own back lots in the area. These road endings have also been identified as part of the Arenac County Blue Water Trail.

Northport Campground Association, located approximately one mile north of Au Gres, is a privately-owned facility with 135 modern condo campsites. A condo campground is one in which the sites are privately owned.

The Northport Marina, located approximately one mile east of Au Gres, is a privately-owned facility with over 300 privately owned boat slips, and a public boat launching facilities as well as boat sales and storage. Its newly dredged channel is six-feet-deep at the shallowest point. A club house and pool are available to members.

The Huron Breeze Golf Course, located four-and-one-half miles east of Au Gres on the west side of US-23, is a privately owned facility open to the public. It offers an 18-hole golf course and clubhouse.

Standish Township

Standish Township is located in the southeastern section of the County and is bordered by Lake Huron on the east and Bay County on the south. Portions of Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area, owned by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, are located in Standish Township along Lake Huron at the mouth of the Pine River. The boat access on the river in the wildlife area has been designated as launch/landing site in the Blue Water Trail.

A small section of land is being held by the Michigan Department of Transportation for a future freeway ramp. A small Roadside Park is also owned by the Michigan Department of Transportation. The major waterways in this township are the Pine River and the South and Middle Branches of the Pine. Saganing Creek runs across the width of the Township in the southern section.

Other Recreational Property

Portions of the Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area, a 4,326 acres facility, are located in Sections 10 and 15 of the Township along Lake Huron at the mouth of the Pine River. This newly expanded property belongs to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and was acquired through funds generated by duck hunting fees.

The primary focus of the area is recreational sport hunting of waterfowl, deer, pheasant, grouse, woodcock, rabbit and turkey. The area is dedicated to the improvement of waterfowl habitat. It provides an excellent deer and pheasant habitat, and it also has the highest breeding woodcock population on Saginaw Bay. The area is open to educational activities by the public.

Pine River Public Access Site is located in Section 10 of the Township at the mouth of



the Pine River in the Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area. It provides access to Saginaw Bay. It is administered by the Recreation Division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. The development of picnic areas, wildlife viewing facilities for handicapped, nature walks, and increased parking areas are included in the long range plans for this facility. As indicated above, it is designated as a launch/landing site on the Arenac County Blue Water Trail.

The Standish School District Property, located in Section 12 of the Township on Pine River Road, is an undeveloped site consists of 80 acres of pine trees. It is owned by the Standish-Sterling School District. It is not available for public use.

The City of Standish Property is located in Section 12 adjoining the school property. This 25 acre City-owned site is undeveloped.

Whites Beach is located in Section 29 of the Township. Public access to Lake Huron is available at this site. This is also a launch/landing site on the Arenac County Blue Water Trail.

Outdoor Adventures – Saginaw Bay is a privately owned facility with 376 camping sites and 20 rental units. The site has a small pond with a beach, hiking trials, playground, pool, hot tub, putt-putt, fishing, basketball, horseshoes, volleyball, and planned activities.

The Eagle Bay Marina, located on Lake Huron on Sagatoo Road, is a privately owned marina also designated as a potential launch/landing site on the Arenac County Blue Water Trail.

The Pine River Golf Club, located at 2244 Pine River Road, facility is a privately-owned golf course but is open to the public. It offers an I8-hole golf course and clubhouse on 80 acres.

Turner Township

Turner Township is located in the northeastern section of the County and is bordered by losco County. The Township is comprised of 30.84 square miles. The major waterway is the Au Gres River which is located toward the eastern border of Turner Township. Other waterways include Big Creek and Cedar Creek Drain.

Township Property

Forty acres of wooded land is located at the intersection of Gawlic and Swartz Roads in Section 16. This property is presently undeveloped. There are no immediate plans for its development.

Other Recreational Property

The property previously owned by the Arenac Eastern High School, located at the intersection of East Twining Road and Herr Road in Section 23, is now private property consisting of 80 acres of wooded land and is unavailable to the public.



Village of Turner

The Village of Turner is located in the northwest section of Turner Township.

Village Property

This property consists of a one block area located between Second Street and Third Street; North Street is on the west side of this property and Pine Street is on the east side. This property contains a pole barn for storage of a tractor, dump truck, and other Village equipment. The Village is planning to construct a lighted tennis court and basketball court next to the storage building. The playground equipment (swing set and slide) at the Depot Grounds have been reinstalled at this site. Future plans include picnic tables and other unspecified improvements.

Two lots along the Turner A. Scott Drain are located between First and Main Streets, bounded on the east by Pine Street and on the west by the railroad tracks. This property is presently undeveloped.

Other Recreational Property

A one block area of property (the old Depot Grounds) bordered by Main Street to the north, "A" Street to the west, and Railroad Street to the east is owned by the Lake State Railway Company and leased to the Village of Turner. It presently includes playground equipment and a memorial plaque. The playground swings and slide have been moved to the location between Second and Third Streets.

Whitney Township

Whitney Township is located in the northeast comer of the County and is bordered by losco County and Lake Huron. This includes Big Charity Island, 222.13 acres of which 99% is owned by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service. The State of Michigan owns approximately 1,295 acres as part of the Au Sable State Forest along the losco County line. Waterways include the Whitney Drain, the East Branch of the Au Gres River and a small section of the Au Gres River. Cranberry Lake, a 34 acre dry lake, is located in the northeast section of the Township.

Township Property

Whitney Township Property is located on Delano Road in Section 21 of the Township. Lake Huron is approximately four miles to the east. This undeveloped property, 60 acres of wooded land has ample room for recreational development.

Whitney Township Quarry, a 120-acre site, is located on Noble Road in Section 24 of the township. The quarry has been depleted of valuable gravel. A plan has been created for trails and other recreational uses, but has not been implemented.



Other Recreational Property

The DNR access to Singing Bridge is funded jointly through the Dingell-Johnson "Federal Aid in Fish Restoration Act" and with Michigan Fishing License fees. This site, administered by the Recreation Division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, is located on US-23 at the Whitney Drain (East Branch of the Au Gres River). It is a public fishing site, with parking for a 120 cars and pit toilets available. It is the scene of surf fishing for Steelhead and Chinook salmon in Spring & Fall. It is a swimming site in the summer. The site has been designated as a launch/landing site on the Arenac County Blue Water Trail.

There are two sites along the Whitney Drain about 4 miles west of the Singing Bridge Public Access, one off Noble Road and one off Turner Road, that offer access to the naturalized drain. These locations are owned by the DNR and can provide access by kayakers and canoers to the Arenac County Blue Water Trail.

Brown's Landing RV Park is located at 1129 Dyer Road at the Arenac-losco county line on Lake Huron. This privately-owned facility has 80 campsites for recreational vehicles. Electricity and water are provided for all 80 sites while sewer is provided to 50 sites. A shower house, rest rooms, and a dump station are available. The 350 foot Lake Huron frontage provides swimming opportunities to campers and the park owners carry out Charity Island boat tours. The site also has a 120' pier. This site at the end of Dyer Road is designated as a launch/landing site on the Arenac County Blue Water Trail.

The Singing Bridge Golf Course is located on US-23 approximately nine miles north of Au Gres. A driving range and an I8-hole, par 72 golf course are open to the public.





Trails

Communities across the United States are creating regional trail systems in both cities and rural areas to provide a higher quality of life for residents. In fact, of all the states, Michigan has the largest rail-trail system. Even more impressive, these trails cover long distances, which is uncommon in other states. Trails give residents the opportunity to be more active and healthy, safer while walking or biking on the roads, additional ways to experience their community, and give all users the option of increased mobility in different modes of travel.

Historically, the roads in the County have been designed with only automobile traffic in mind. However, communities are now working toward creating a network of trails and roads that are accessible to several forms of traffic. This often means sharing the existing road right-of-way with bikes or having a separate pathway running parallel to the road which is designated for non-motorized use and connects regional centers.

Why trails are important

While trails can be a challenge to implement, their positive effects on a community cannot be disputed. It has been proven that trails create a pride of place and sense of ownership in Michigan residents. Trails are also an important driver in the local and regional economy, increase property values, and provide safe and healthy recreation options. The growing trail trend in Michigan is also reflected in the County. Trails and pathways would be an asset to the community.

Trail users have a measurable impact on the local economy. Working with the surrounding townships and other jurisdictions is an effective way to connect with existing systems and expand the non-motorized pathway infrastructure. These projects would create a long-term, valuable investment in the community and the opportunity to connect the County to others in the region This would promote economic vitality, encourage a healthier lifestyle in their residents, and create a safer travel environment.

County of Arenac Trails and Pathways

Iron Belle - Saganing Anishinabak Miikana Section

The Iron Belle Trail is a set of two trails that traverses the entire state of Michigan from Belle Isle in Detroit to Ironwood in the Upper Peninsula. The eastern trail, 827 miles, is a bike route that utilizes existing bike paths, bike lanes, and designated biking routes. The western trail, 1,203 miles, is the hiking route that uses the North Country National Scenic Trail. The eastern trail is planned to traverse the County. The current route will follow the Lake State railroad bed from the southern border of the County to the City of Omer. From Omer, the trail will follow US 23 to Au Gres, then will continue along US 23 to the northern border of the County. This path will total 31 miles of non-motorized facilities in the County. The future plans for this trail are referenced in the MDOT Bay Region Non-Motorized Transportation Plan.

TRAIL SECTIONS STATUS UPDATE:

Southern County Line to Omer – The DNR staff has secured a Trust Fund Grant for an easement agreement along the Lake State Railroad right-of way.

Omer to Au Gres - The Arenac County Economic Development Corporation and the Arenac Heritage Route Authority are working with a consultant and preliminary engineering is complete for this section of the trail.


These authorities are also working with The Saginaw Midland Municipal Water Supply Corporation (SMMWSC) to secure an easement for the location of the trail.

Au Gres to Northern County Line – The Arenac County Economic Development Corporation is working with a consultant to identify a possible location for the trail within the US-23 right-of-way. Concept approval for this location has been granted by MDOT.

The County is making great strides to work toward connecting their portion of this statewide Iron Belle Trail. See Map 10 below for a closer look at all three sections of the trail.

Arenac County Saginaw Bay Water Trail

In addition to the non-motorized trails in the County, there is also a water trail in the County that follows the coast from the southern border to the northern border of the County. In 2014 the Parks and Recreation Commission completed the Arenac County Blue Water Trail Development Plan that has laid out a kayak/canoe trail along the Saginaw Bay shore. This trail connects the Huron Shores Coastal Water Trail (north of the County) and the Tip of the Thumb Heritage Water Trail in Huron County. All the trail along the coasts of Arenac and Bay Counties is part of the Saginaw Bay Water Trail System. Efforts are underway to build and promote the Blue Water Trail. The county is partnering with Saginaw Bay Resource, Conservation, and Development and the Saginaw Bay Water Trail Alliance to pursue these efforts.

Map 11 - Saginaw Bay Water Trail System





Other Trails in the County

The County does not have any dedicated non-motorized trail pathways, however the County does have 29 miles of paved shoulders (greater than 4ft in width). This follows the path of US 23 in the County. One potential project that was discussed during the stakeholder interviews for this plan, was a potential path along old M-76 from Standish to Sterling. The Road Commission is planning to resurface this road in 3 years, and the right-of-way is large enough for a dedicated non-motorized pathway. In addition to this opportunity, the County also has a Bicycle and Pedestrian Trail Master Plan written in 2014 by the Arenac Heritage Route Authority. This plan identifies several other possible trail locations in detail. The implementation chapter of this plan is located in Appendix B and references the other potential trail locations in the County.

BIRDING SITES AND NATURAL AREAS

The Saginaw Bay is listed as an Important Bird Area by the National Audubon Society. An array of waterbird species use the Saginaw Bay Area as a migratory stopover site, wintering ground, and breeding ground. The County is within this region which extends 142 miles from Port Crescent State Park in Huron County to Tawas State Park in losco County. To highlight this important natural resource, the Saginaw Bay Land Conservancy created the Saginaw Bay Birding Trail. There are several birding sites in the County listed as a part of this birding trail, see Map 13 below.

In the County, the birding trail and natural area stops include:



Community Input Survey Results

One of the most important aspects of a community's Parks and Recreation Plan is the detailed review and analysis of the resident's opinions regarding the future of their parks and recreation system. The County of Arenac created a community survey that pertained to both, the update of the Master Plan and the update of the Recreation Plan. The survey was designed to gather the information which would guide the County master plan policies and parks and recreation program. A complete tabulation of the results is available for review in Appendix C. The text below provides a description of the significant results for the questions pertaining only to recreation.

Overall, the survey had 37 questions, and there were a total of 651 responses. Of those 37 questions, 5 questions were specific to parks and recreation, and 3 additional questions were related to parks and recreation. The County advertised the community input survey on the County website, provided hard copies of the survey at the County building, City of Au Gres library, and City of Omer library, and launched a targeted advertisement on Facebook. The online survey was available from October 2019 to November of 2019, at www.arenaccountysurvey.com.

A second means of input was collected during a day-long stakeholder interview process. In the fall of 2019, the County held a series of stakeholder interviews that focused on both Master Plan and Recreation Plan topics. Recreation was often central to the discussion because it is so important to the County. A summary of those interviews can be found in Appendix D.

A third means of input was provided during the required public review period. The draft plan was available for review at LOCATION and on the LOCATION from DATE to DATE. The required public hearing took place on DATE at LOCATION.

SURVEY RESULTS

The following analysis is a selective review of the most relevant survey results. The following questions are the are most interesting and pertinent to the future of recreation in the County. To view a complete report of surrey results, please reference Appendix C.

Respondents

Overall, there were 651 survey respondents, 83.3% were residents of the County, the remaining respondents were from outside of the County or considered it to be a second home due to a seasonal residence.


The survey respondents represented a wide age range of individuals. The largest percentage of respondents was in the 55 - 64 age group. The following age groups were almost equally represented: 35 - 44, 45 - 54, and 65 - 74. There was smaller participation from the 18 - 24, 25 - 34, and 75 - 85 ranges, with very little participation from the under 18 age group, and the 85 and older age group.

Response Summary


The respondents were asked a couple general questions about parks and recreation. These questions asked respondents to rank how important each topic was from the following choices: very important, important, needs to be considered, but not a priority, not important, or no opinion. In general, respondents think that

parks and recreation in the County are better or about the same as they were 5 years ago and believe that the preservation, protection, and enhancement of natural resources in the county is very important or very important. Additionally, respondents believe that the preservation of scenic character and the seasonal economy are both very important or important to the County. Finally, respondents thought that improving public spaces to enhance quality of life was very important or important.

Which County Parks have you visited in the past year?



The most popular of all the County Parks was the County Fairgrounds which almost 70% of respondents said they had visited in the past year. Point Au Gres Park had approximatlye 66% or the respondents visit it in the last year, Oasis Park had 28%, and Youngman Park, the least visited park, had 15% of respondents say they had been to the park in the past year.




Which activities have you participated in at Arenac County Parks over the past year?

- Launched a boat or kayak (47.1%)
- Swam (45.1%)
- Used a pavilion (44.8%)

The other options are shown in the chart above. Some additional write in responses included: County Fair, hunting, picnic/BBQ, and horseback riding.






The chart above shows the responses for this question in order of desirability. The majority of the respondents would like to see restrooms (70.9%). In addition to restrooms other respondents would like to see fishing piers (50.6%), pavilions and picnic areas (47.9%), and playground equipment (44.2%). Some of the write-in answers included: trials (biking, hiking, horseback riding and motorized), beach, and a dog park.

If a respondent indicated there was someone in their family who has a disability, they were asked what specifically would make parks more enjoyable for their families.



Most respondents would like the see both accessible restrooms and accessible parking. Accessible beach access was also important to the majority of the respondents. One write in response also suggested accessible playground equipment.

Goals and Objectives

Developing goals and objectives is an important part of the recreation planning process. Overall, the County wants to provide quality recreation opportunities for the community it serves. More specific goals, like those listed below, must be based on public input, the demographic characteristics of the population served, and other physical and environmental characteristics of the County.

Read this chapter with the following principles in mind. Goals are the broadest level, they are overreaching and general. By nature, objectives are the measurable items which carry out the purpose of a goal. Action items are the last level, and they identify specific projects and programs to be pursued over the next five years. Action items can include organizational, staffing, programming, public information, and operation and maintenance actions. The County Board formulated the following goals and objectives based upon the characteristics of the overall community, the online survey, and other factors such as sports participation trends.

Goal 1: Expand recreation opportunities and facilities to meet the growing need of both, the County residents and the growing tourist population.

- Continue to add amenities to the County park facilities based upon community input and need.
- Strike a recreation balance between the needs of the year-round population and tourism population.
- Improve/upgrade existing park facilities.
- Provide for nature-based recreation opportunities.
- Move Arenac County Events and Agricultural Center to new location and begin operations

Goal 2: Prioritize parks and recreation projects that improve accessibility at all County parks.

- Improve barrier free access to existing recreation facilities
- Ensure that improvements and upgrades to park facilities are accessible.
- Where possible, strive to meet universal design standards with new signage, park amenities, and facilities.

Goal 3: Preserve the County's natural beauty and assets

- Ensure for the protection of the County's environmental assets including its natural features and scenic qualities such as the Lake Huron shoreline, forests, open spaces, wetlands, and rivers.
- When feasible, acquire key properties that will protect natural resources in the County.
- Acquire new public lands to meet the recreational needs of the community.
- Work to expand public access along the Lake Huron shoreline.
- Plan for projects that build on the natural assets in the County.

Goal 4: Expand year-round recreation opportunities

• Provide recreation opportunities that take advantage of all four seasons.

Goal 5: Improve transparency and public involvement for all County Parks and Recreation decision-making.

- To coordinate and cooperate with the local municipalities and school districts, and regional recreation providers to furnish ample facilities for our citizens and visitors.
- Advertise/Inform residents and visitors of the existing park facilities.
- Seek public input on all future park improvement projects.
- Advertise/Inform residents and visitors of recreation programming available in the County.

Goal 6: Support and plan for non-motorized transportation corridors the County

- Work with County Road Commission to plan non-motorized transportation routes that connect County community centers
- Work with the State and regional recreation providers to support the development of the Iron Belle Trail in the County.
- Improve pathways within the County parks by paving existing walks and adding new pathways to connect amenities or provide for walking/exercise opportunities.
- Support trail amenities along the non-motorized corridors such as trailheads, restrooms, signage, and safety measures.
- Support the development/advertising of the Saginaw Bay Blue Water trail.
- Support water trail amenities such as canoe/kayak launches and access points.

Goal 7: Improve camping opportunities at the County parks and utilize camping fees as a way to support future park projects.

- Improve rustic campsites and Oasis Lake Park
- Add camper hook-ups at Oasis Lake Park
- Improve camping facilities at Pt. Au Gres Park and Campground.
- Market these camping opportunities to visitors

Goal 8: Make County parks a draw for tourism in the County.

- Advertise/Market County parks to the tourists who visit or drive through the County
- Advertise/Market County parks as a destination to bring additional visitors to the County.
- Add amenities to parks that appeal to tourism and seasonal visitors
- Capitalize on the existing access to the County's unique natural features that is already available at County parks such as the Lake Huron Shoreline and Oasis Lake.
- Consider adding facilities or events to the County parks that are unique. These events or amenities would draw regional visitors to create more interest in the County parks.



Action Plan

With goals and objectives in place, the Arenac County Parks & Recreation Commission developed a five-year action program that will enable them to move toward accomplishing the goals and objectives. The action program details the direction the Parks & Recreation Commission wishes to take over the next five years in order to maintain and improve the quality and diversity of its park and recreation opportunities.

Potential projects are shown on the following page, titled "Project List." Each action item on the project list relates to one or more of the lettered goals from the Goals and Objectives section of this Plan. These potential capital improvements that are described on the following page have been established to not only provide a framework for decision makers, but to also enable the County to apply for grant funding for the proposed projects.

The project list is not a fixed element nor is it exhaustive. The project list reflects the results of the input received from the Parks & Recreation Commission, County staff, and the online survey. Future circumstances, especially availability of funding, may influence the order in which the projects are completed.

The action program is shown in the table on the following page.

FINANCING POTENTIAL IMPROVEMENTS

Funding for parks and recreation capital improvements can come from a range of local, state, and federal programs. Grant funding is available for parks and recreation projects. However, applicants need to target potential funding agencies and programs very carefully so as to meet the specific criteria required. Appendix E contains a current listing of programs and agencies that can provide funding for parks and recreation projects.

Planning Process

In its continuing effort to provide quality recreational opportunities for its citizens, the County has developed a Parks and Recreation Master Plan as a tool to guide the development of community park and recreational facilities and locations over the next five years. This plan is the latest effort by the local governmental officials in the County to establish recreational goals and objectives for the community. The plan will also provide the County with eligibility for grants from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to assist the community in reaching its recreational goals.

The County of Arenac contracted with Spicer Group of Saginaw, Michigan, to assist them with completion of the Parks and Recreation Master Plan. The consultant worked with the County staff and the Drain Commission through the course of the plan.

Data was collected about the County including maps, demographics, park information and an inventory of existing facilities. This data was collected from a number of resources such as: county staff, relevant planning documents, field observations and various websites.

Community input was collected via an online survey. Based upon the existing information and the community input, the County reviewed and revised its goals and objectives for parks and recreation. Then, action plan items were written that would work toward accomplishing the goals and objectives.

The consultant completed the draft Recreation Master Plan document. The plan was made available for review online and at the County office for at least 30 days beginning on DATE. This reviewing opportunity was advertised in the LOCATION. The final opportunity for community input occurred at the advertised public meeting held prior to adoption of the plan. This meeting was held on DATE, at the LOCATION at ADDRESS.

On DATE, the County of Arenac Board of Commissioners passed a resolution adopting the Recreation Plan. Copies of the advertisements and resolutions are included in the Appendix.

Copies of the Recreation Plan were transmitted to the East Michigan Council of Governments and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) in DATE.



















We cannot use the property as we planned when we purchased. We never thought we would have to put in a sea wall to save our house.

I have owned my home since 1962 and had it raised in 1986, during the last high water period. My home itself has not been impacted, but there is standing water in every low area in the neighborhood. Our road has flooded several times this summer. The roads are awful in my subdivision. Because of all the standing water, I have a feeling that many trees will die... The maples started turning red back in August. Many other trees have fallen this year. The property behind my house is full of water. The property next to my house is full of water. The mosquitoes are terrible. Living near the water is both a blessing and a curse.

Had to reinforce sea walls, loss of beach, inability to put out dock.

High water has done damage to our seawall.

I live on the AuGres river...the levels are very high..flooding is occurring in surrounding areas away from the river. Depending on how the winds are blowing, water is over the seawalls

Appendix D – Stakeholder Interview Summary

County of Arenac Stakeholder Interview Summary Key Takeaways

This document lists six key takaways from the stakeholder interviews conduted on November 11, 2019 with County community leaders, decisionmakers, and representatives of organizations and businesses in Arenac County. The purpose of the meetings was to provide an opportunity for stakeholders to identify major issues, ideas, and concerns facing the County in preparation to update to the County of Arenac Master Plan and Parks and Recreation Plan. This is one of several community outreach activities that is being undertaken for the master planning and recreation planning process.

The County is a recreation haven for almost all adventurer types. This is the County's strongest asset and economic driver, however, more needs to be done to focus and advertise all the opportunities the County has to offer. Almost all the traffic traveling north on the east side of the State must drive through the County. In the future it will be crucial to draw in these travelers and make Arenac County a State-wide recreation destination.

There are two very distinct population groups the County, the year-round residents and the recreation focused visitors. The local municipalities have the challenge of catering to the very different needs and service expectations of these two important segments of the County population. The County and local governments need to strike a healthy balance between the groups.

The current economic development efforts in the County need to be expanded. The program needs a full-time director which will be essential to Arenac County's success.

A key focus of Recreation development in the County in the future should focus on non-motorized trail development, connecting the County to the Iron Belle Trail and connecting the various communities in the County via non-motorized transportation routes.

Arenac County has two strong school districts that offer full-time residents the option to choose the type of program that is best for their children. The schools are a cornerstone for the local municipalities and provide a strong sense of community. The County is lacking a community college presence that would help train the local residents and keep them in the area.

The Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe is an important entity in the County and is working to expand their properties and the economic development opportunities available in the County. While the casino is generally its own entity, the 2% grants they provide to the local governments are very helpful and appreciated.
